The Master reflects on the passing year

s I pen these words, my term of office is all but over, with only a few functions to attend before I hand over to David Port on October 6. One of my ambitions during the year has been to increase the profile of our charitable activities, with the hope that members of the Company will see the Charitable Trust Fund being more active and encouraged to contribute more, if they are able.

In the last edition of *The Fueller*, you may have read of our support for the British Paralympic Team and we look forward to hearing news of their successes shortly. In this issue, you will see how we raised over £4,000 for the British Red Cross. The Trust has also supported various charities, including City of London Girl's School, London Area of Sea Cadets (provision of fuel for engineering training), Guildhall School Trust as well as supporting Liveryman Chris Le Fevre as he ascends Mt Kilimanjaro to raise funds for Diabetes UK Research. We continue to provide "fuel" for City of London Sea Cadets in the form of their electricity.

Normally, we work on the principle of "giving a little where it helps a lot", but in this case, I decided to give some small amounts to various charities I feel deserve improved recognition. These have included Sight Savers International who work in the world's poorest countries, restoring sight and giving hope to many adults and children who are needlessly blind; Water Aid, an

international non-governmental organisation dedicated exclusively to the provision of safe domestic water, sanitation and hygiene education to the world's poorest people; The Prostate Cancer Charity and I have not finished yet!

The Court approved The Fuellers' Charles Stephenson Clarke Prize which will be an annual award of £1,000 to an MSc student undertaking the Energy and Environmental Technology and Economics Programme at the School of Engineering and Mathematical Sciences, City University, London.


Two further energy educational awards are under consideration, as is the possibility of providing the fuel for an RNLI Thames lifeboat on an annual basis and giving assistance to certain families of those in need from our own industries. We are also looking at the possibility of a longer term link with a selected inner-London school and it is hoped that many of these new projects will be well developed in the near future.

As we really start to give more money, we naturally need more. In the fullness of time, the sale of prints of our painting of an RAF Tristar will increase our available funds, but if you can possible contribute on a regular basis, as many are already doing, it would enable us to do more, as the appeals to our Trust are gathering momentum. Aside from charity matters, I hope that you have enjoyed the year as much as Chloë and I have. There has been a varied calendar of events, in which many have participated and I hope it encourages you to invite other like-minded people to join our Company. I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at David's installation dinner and also giving him the support in his year that I have received from so many of you in my year.

Discover your City

The Corporation of London have recently published a free 72-page booklet entitled "Discover your City". The objective is to highlight the enormous range and diversity of the cultural attractions available throughout the City of London. The publication seeks to encourage those who live and work in London to explore the myriad of attractions in and around the City. It contains twelve chapters under the following headings: Art, craft and design; comedy; dance; faith; festivals; libraries, lectures and training; markets, malls and galleries; museums and monuments; music classical/opera; music - non-classical;

open spaces, and theatre and cinema. The listings within each chapter are a revelation. For example, the section on "Markets, malls and galleries" lists a number of street markets of which the reviewer was completely unaware. Whereas everyone knows of Petticoat Lane Market, there are several others which do not immediately spring to mind, such as Ridley Road Market: Hoxton Street Market; Brick Lane Market and the Columbia Road Flower Market. The same is true of the chapter on "Museums and monuments" which lists 45 attractions, ranging from The Mansion House to Bunhill Fields in City Road. The latter is reputed to be the largest

unconsecrated cemetery in Europe, resting place for an estimated 120,000 bodies. As would be expected, the Lord Mayor's Show appears under the "Festivals" listing, but the reviewer had not realised there was The Mayor's Thames Festival, including a riverside Lantern Procession, in September. Each entry carries brief details of the attraction, together with relevant addresses, telephone numbers or web-site information.

Fuellers gen up on pumped storage

Dinorwig is the UK's largest pumped storage electricity generating facility, constructed in the 1970's/early 80's and capable of providing 1,728 MW capacity with six units running. A 14-strong party, members of the Fuellers with guests and members of MEUC (Major Energy Users Council) visited the plant in the heart of Snowdonia on a Friday in July. The participants were left with an overwhelming impression of spectacular scale and technological achievement.

The party was first guided on a tour of the underground powerhouse in a cavern large enough to house St Paul's Cathedral, by Mike Hickey, Director of Asset Management and Mike Maudsley, Operations Director of Edison Mission, the owner.

The turbines can reach full capacity from spinning in air in 10 sec or from stationary in 90 sec (as fast as anywhere in the world). Water flows in a closed circuit between two lakes differing in elevation by 600 m. It discharges through tunnels (up to 10 m dia) and through turbines to meet peak demand on the National Grid. It is subsequently pumped up-hill using the same machinery at night-time. The total storage potential is nine Giga-Watt hours, sufficient for five hours generation at peak capacity.



FUEL FOR THOUGHT

£3 million allocated to development of fuel cell technology

A £3.2 million funding package from the Department of Trade and Industry is to be used to develop fuel-cell technology in a bid to make it a more efficient and economically viable energy source. The funding has been awarded to Johnson Matthey Fuel Cells, Limited. The company will work together with its collaborators: Intellicoat Technologies, Limited; Technical Fibre Products, Limited, Primasil Silicones, Limited and MAST Carbons, Limited. The project aims to develop and evaluate novel design approaches, materials, and production assemblies for making membrane electrode assemblies for PEM fuel cells. The objective is to achieve lower production costs that could help developers meet the challenging cost targets for fuel cells in large-scale automotive applications.

£50 million boost for wind and tidal energy

The UK Government has recently allocated £50 million to the Marine Research Development Fund, as part of the drive to harness wave and tidal stream power. The announcement coincided with the publication of a study from the Scottish Executive's Forum for Renewable Energy Development in Scotland's subgroup on Marine Energy.

The Marine Energy Group's report sets out an action plan to:

- Accelerate the commercial deployment of marine energy devices in Scotland;
- 2 maximise the contribution from marine energy to Scotlands's energy mix by 2020, and
- 3 develop a sustainable manufacturing base for marine energy technologies in Scotland.

Work on the precise mechanism for the development of wave and tidal streams is underway with the Scottish Executive, Carbon Trust and other key stakeholders.

Coal Authority report reveals drop in licence applications

The Coal Authority has recently published its ninth Annual Report and Accounts, covering the period to 31 March, 2004. It is revealed that the Authority received 34 new applications during 2003 - 2004 for licences to enter its coal, a 29% reduction on those for 2002 - 2003. The reduction in activity was wholly related to England which had 15 fewer applications (54%) whilst the figure for Scotland increased by 3 (23%) and Wales by one (25%).

There was a continuing lack of interest in the underground mining and methane sectors with only one application being received for each compared with three underground and six methane applications in the previous year. Exploration activity also reduced significantly with only 12 applications compared to 23 in 2002 - 2003. Opencast applications however rose from 11 to 13 with additional applications in both Scotland and Wales offsetting a fall in England.

Coal production in the financial year was 26.3 million tonnes, a reduction in output from the previous year of 2.6 million tonnes (9%). This decline was due to reductions in English opencast output of 1.3 million tonnes and English underground output of 0.9 million tonnes, Scottish opencast output reduced by 0.3 million tonnes and Welsh underground output by 0.2 million tonnes. The only area with a rise in output was opencast coal production in Wales which rose by 0.1 million tonnes.

At the end of March 2004 some 8,073 persons were reported as being employed at 61 producing opencast sites and collieries.

The disposal of surplus property raised proceeds of £19.2 million for the year. A total of 561 hectares of land were sold. The largest sale was the former Markham Main colliery site in Yorkshire which was reclaimed by the Authority and made available for residential development. Other notable sales included the Auldton Heights potential surface mining site in Scotland and Silverdale Colliery site in Staffordshire.

Government awards £2.2 million for solar power

The Government recently announced a further £2.2 million in funding awards for solar energy projects throughout the UK. Twenty-four projects were chosen for funding at a grant cost of just over £2.2 million resulting in almost 650 kWp being directly funded in this round. Projects were awarded to 11 regions and to nine different installers. Housing associations, councils and schools and businesses are among those who will benefit from this funding round. The round supports medium to large (5 - 100 kWp) scale solar electric power installations under the Government's £25 million Major Photovoltaics (PV) Demonstration Programme. Projects to be supported include a Children's Hospice in Guildford, a large housing development in Huddersfield, a cemetery in Nottingham and a school on the Isle of Wight.

Government energy statistics point to steep decline in coal production

The first quarter energy statistics recently released by the Department of Trade and Industry reveal that the indigenous production of primary fuels was 65.4 million tonnes of oil equivalent in the first quarter of 2004 – 10.4% lower than in the first quarter of 2003. Final energy consumption in the first quarter of 2004 was 0.7% higher than in the first quarter of 2003.

Total inland consumption on a primary fuel input basis was 247.9 million tonnes of oil equivalent in the first quarter of 2004, 0.9% higher than in the same quarter in 2003. Between the first quarters of 2003 and 2004, coal and other solid fuel consumption fell by 0.9%; oil consumption increased by 0.9%; gas consumption rose by 2.7%, and primary electricity consumption decreased by 4.1%.

Provisional figures for the first quarter of 2004 show that coal production (including an estimate for

slurry) was 18.6% down on the first quarter of 2003 at 6.4 million tonnes, with deep mined production down 22.4% and opencast production down 14.6% Imports of coal in the first quarter of 2004 were 28.0% higher than in the first quarter of 2004 at 8.9 million tonnes. Demand for coal in the first quarter of 2004, at 18.1 million tonnes, was 2.4% down on consumption in the first quarter of 2003; consumption by electricity generators was down by 2.3%. Coal stocks showed a seasonal fall of 2.7 million tonnes during the first quarter of 2004 and at the end of March 2004 stood at 10.9 million tonnes, 2.0 million tonnes lower than at the end of March 2003. By the end of April, the seasonal increase had taken coal stocks slightly higher to 10.9 million tonnes.

Total indigenous UK production of crude oil and NGLs in the first quarter of 2004 decreased by 11.0% compared with 2003 to 25.5 million tonnes. Only five new fields started production after March 2003. Production from these fields was insufficient to make up for the general decline in production from older established fields. The UK retained its position as a net exporter of oil and oil products. Exports of petroleum products rose by 4.0% whilst imports fell by 20.1%

Total indigenous UK production of natural gas in the first quarter of 2004 was 9.7% lower than in the

corresponding quarter a year earlier. Compared with the first quarter of 2003, exports of natural gas in the first quarter of 2004 decreased by 61.0% and imports more then doubled. Demand for gas in the first quarter of 2004 was 1.8% higher than the level in the first quarter of 2003. Gas use for electricity generation was 7.0% higher than in the first quarter of 2003, despite continuing high gas prices.

Fuel used by generators in the first quarter of 2004 was, in total, 0.4% lower than in the first quarter of 2003. Coal use during the quarter was 2.3% lower than a year earlier, but gas use was up by 7.2% and hydro sources by 65%. Nuclear sources were down by 6.3%. Total electricity supplied by all generators in the first quarter of 2004 was 4.5% higher than a year earlier.

Of particular interest was the first appearance of figures for renewable energy in 2003. The statistics showed that electricity generated from all renewables as a percentage of total UK electricity generation rose to 2.7% in 2003, using the international definition of renewables. In 2002, on the same basis, it was 2.9% the reduction being caused by low hydro output in a dry year. In 2003, the percentage of UK electricity sales that were from sources eligible for the Renewables Obligation (RO) was 2.2%, up from 1.8% in 2002. Total electricity generation from all renewable sources in 2003 was 10,649 GWh, 29% of which was from large scale hydro generation. Generation from renewable sources, other than large scale hydro, was 16% higher in 2003 than in 2002.

North Sea oil prospects still attracting global interest

Recent responses to the 22nd Offshore and 12th Onshore Licensing Round have shown that there is still a great deal of international interest in the opportunities afforded in the UK for oil and gas exploration and recovery. In addition to the Traditional licences and the recently introduced Promote licences, the 22nd Offshore Round saw the introduction of the innovative "Frontier" licence designed to spark interest in the newly-offered blocks to the North and West of the Shetlands islands. All three licences generated an encouraging amount of interest.

- 4 Frontier licence applications were received, proving the worth of innovation when seeking to encourage exploration;
- 42 Promote licence applications were received, a further improvement on last year's highly successful result;
- 30 Traditional licence application were received, equalling the tally from 2003;
- 164 seaward blocks were applied for in total, 25 more than the previous round;
- 20 of the 68 companies who applied are potentially new entrants in the North Sea, further endorsing the belief that the UKCS is still a vibrant basin for investment and reward, and
- 30 applications for onshore licences, more than three times the amount from the previous round.

The Fuellers' Company has once again entered a team for the Inter-Livery Swimathon. The event is to be held at the Royal Automobile Club, Woodcote Park, Epsom, Surrey, on the afternoon of Monday, 27 September. The team, led by our participating Captain, Rex Rose, includes Chloë Barrow; Stuart Anderson; Michael Byrne; Carrie Marsh; Philip Newhouse, and Ilse Price. As in previous years, each swimmer is responsible for raising individual sponsorship. However, this year, it is hoped that Company members will support the Fuellers' team collectively. Master suffers incarceration in Tower of London

Earlier this year, our Master, Doug Barrow, whilst taking coffee at the Mansion House with the Lord Mayor, Alderman Robert Finch, was somewhat taken aback when he was arrested by the City of London Police. The trumped-up charge claimed that he was plotting, in the company of 17 others, to tunnel from the Mansion House to the Bank of England, with the intention of breaking into the vaults. Protesting his innocence, he was forcibly taken to the Tower of London under a police escort. On the way to his incarceration, he was publicly shamed by being paraded in front

of tourists and other commoners. Greater disgrace was to follow when he was fingerprinted as a common criminal.

However, aided by the wonders of modern communications, word of the Master's plight reached the ears' of Jane Ayre who promptly organised an Escape Committee. She was soon to learn that corrupt jailers were prepared to leave the cell door open upon payment of a substantial sum to The British Red Cross, so that the organisation's City of London Sector could continue their charitable work in London. Jane immediately set

about raising the ransom. In the event she was able to persuade the Fuellers and friends to part with an amazing £3,865 (which benefited by a further £421 with the tax recovered under Gift Aid). In fact, realising their good fortune, the jailers also released the Master's co-conspirators, thereby raising in excess of £30,000.

Stumbling back into the light of day, the Master made his way to a local hostelry to quench his raging thirst with London Pride and thus blot out the memories of a shameful day.





The Master was subjected to several indignities in the Tower, including being photographed with his jailors and having his "dabs" taken by one of the prison officers. However, the timely arrival of an exorbitant bribe saved him from being hung, drawn and quartered.

Following in the Master's footsteps, there has been another Fuellers' Company wedding. Earlier this year, Court Assistant Air Vice Marshall John Price married Ilse in Papenburg in Germany. John Pugh - an appreciation

Members of the Fuellers' Company were greatly saddened to learn of the recent death of Past Master John B Pugh after a short illness. John was educated at Sutton Valance School. He was to be called up just before the end of the Second World War and served in the Buffs in Africa. After demobilisation, he qualified as a Chartered Accountant, before joining the family firm of Pugh & Co

The firm's main business was in the domestic market. It supplied several members of the Royal Family, including the Queen, and as a result, it was a Royal Warrant holder. At one time, with a Head Office in Buckingham Palace Road, Pugh and Co. had six depots in and around London and a dozen or more sales offices.

However, the continuing decline in the use of coal, particularly as a domestic fuel, made it necessary, eventually, to sell the business. When the firm was sold to Charringtons in 1979, Pughs had been in business for 180 years; John's father before him had been involved with the company for over 60 years.

For many years, John acted as Treasurer of the Society of Coal Merchants and also served as its Chairman. Until his death, he also remained a member of the Coal Meters Committee which he joined around 1975. As a result, John was a member of two of the three bodies - the other being the Coal Factors - who were responsible for the rebirth of the Fuellers' Company. John was Master of the Fuellers' Company in 1988. John married in 1959, and his wife Margaret is a Freeman, both of the Company and of the City of London. John is survived by two sons and four grandchildren.

John's sporting interests were originally tennis and squash, although he subsequently played golf. He was Honorary Steward at the Wimbledon Tennis Championships for 16 years. To the last, he was a great bridge player.

Together with Richard Horne JP, John was recently the joint recipient of the accolade "Father of the Company".
