The procession set off from Mansion House at 11am. It paused at the Royal Courts while the Lord Mayor gave his oath and then returned up the Victoria Embankment. The families and friends who came along for the day had a wonderful lunch at The Grange St Paul's hotel, whilst the participants were refueled aboard HQS Wellington.

The rain did lighten up through the morning and the crowds spurred on the participants, cheering and highfiving Livery Company Masters and Wardens, as they paraded through the streets of the City.

We were further encouraged by the BBC interview with the Modern Livery Companies float organiser, which also caught sight of the participating Fuellers in the background.

The day ended with a fabulous fireworks display to celebrate the incoming 689th Lord Mayor, Alderman Andrew Parmley.

A glorious visit to HMS Sultan

A strong contingent of 11 Fuellers attended HMS Sultan's Livery day. The programme began with a presentation of HMS Sultan's activities and areas of expertise, followed by a welcome address from the Commanding Officer.

We were then given a presentation titled, "The Glorious Creation and History of the Royal Navy", delivered excellently by one of the young teams training at Sultan.

The steam lorry then took us across to lunch at the Wardroom, followed by a visit to the Machine shop, where we learnt about how 3D printing was being investigated as a means of enabling artificers at sea to create parts in situ, which could save valuable operations time and ease repairs and maintenance without having to carry a multitude of components. The story of a nuclear sub having to surface and return to port, because a dishwasher seal had broken, being an example of how modern technology can help keep missions on track.

After that we were given a tour of the 764 Squadron museum and learnt about the role the site played during WWII for the RAF. We then had a closing address, before all guests departed.

The Fuellers were mentioned a number of times in various addresses, for our continued support for the steam lorry, as well as for our strong participation on the day, where we outnumbered the other Livery Companies attending, which was greatly appreciated by the CO.

Conversation is Fuelled by talk of renewables

November saw the first Fuellers Conversation, supported by EY, of the 2016/17 season. With an audience of 40+ (including 6 Young Energy Professionals from the YEP cohort) it was a terrifically well attended event at which those gathered heard Fueller Andrew Buglass speak to the subject 'Investing in Renewable Energy: The Challenges and Opportunities Ahead.'

First of all, Andrew set out the quite staggering changes that have occurred in the contribution of renewable energy to the overall mix of

generation fuels. It is clear that it has gone from niche to mainstream confirmed by the fact that the contribution of wind and solar in the UK has risen 6-fold in the last 6 years to now stand at 26GW. In the EU, over the past 10 years some \$776bn has been invested in the renewable energy sector and it now represents 25% of the EU energy needs and 50% of the installed capacity.

To achieve such a meteoric rise, it must be acknowledged that the regulatory environment has been very favourable with much in the way of Government supported revenue streams. Andrew went on to explain that this level of support is now seen as probably 'too rich' and there have been changes of policy too in reaction to what one commentator described as 'slavering subsidy junkies' having to move to more normal business models. At the same time and in response the production costs of components have begun to fall quite dramatically and Bloomberg predict that they will have fallen by 41% by 2040.

For Investors therefore, the future normality on which they must base their investment cases has changed significantly. Particularly where generation assets are looking to produce 20-year income streams for Investors when power prices are towards historic lows and top up mechanisms such as the Capacity Market only come with short term contracts. At the same time Investors must

fossil fuel investments.

Ultimately therefore promoters of projects will have to be even more innovative in how they put their business models together whilst financiers must adjust their expectations of returns to the new norm of fast approaching, subsidy free renewable energy.

As always there were many 'conversations' after the formal part of the evening, once again exemplifying the value of these events.

In the October Fueller, I briefly mentioned recent grants to the National Memorial Arboretum and to The Smallpeice Trust.

The National Memorial Arboretum

In November, the Hon. Sec. received the following message from the Chairman of the NMA Appeal.

Two weeks ago the new visitor centre at the National Memorial Arboretum was opened. The building is grand and inside the interpretation centre is moving and educational. But it is Heroes' Square and the Transitional Garden that I write about now. Over 190 paviors representing the Royal Navy, the British Army, the Royal Air Force, and many Livery Companies, Organisations and Clubs associated with the Armed Forces have been engraved and are laid in Heroes' Square. The area looked magnificent and amazingly the weather was lovely and most of the leaves were still on the trees. [The engraved paviors were] much admired and really do make the square very special. We cannot thank you enough for helping us with your donation that made this possible.

The Trust donated \pounds 2,500 to the Appeal, supplemented by a further \pounds 500 from Past Master John Ingham's \pounds 1,000 allowance from the Trust. (In his or her year, every Master is allowed \pounds 1,000 by the Trustees for charities of their choosing).

The Smallpeice Trust

The Smallpeice Trust was founded in 1966 by Dr Cosby Smallpeice, an engineer who invented the Smallpeice lathe. Following his success, he put £1.6 million into forming the Trust to give young people the support they need to bring their ideas to life through science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM). The Trust inspires young people who "are daring enough to think big and imagine. That's why we give 12-18 year olds everything they need to explore their passion for engineering".

Seven Planker

In that issue I also reported a grant to the Great Central Railway towards a project to restore a "seven planker" coal wagon. The Trustees were pleased to receive an update from Liveryman Michael Stokes. The restoration has been turned into an educational project and it appears that work will commence in the New Year. Separately, the GCR has received a £10 million award from the Lottery to build a museum at its Leicester North station. This will be an offshoot of the National Railway Museum with many of the exhibits Great Central Railway orientated. Leicestershire having been a major coal area, the museum curator has asked for the wagon to be one of the exhibits. Michael has agreed on the basis that, as the museum will be rail connected, the wagon will still be able to be used at certain GCR events. This is excellent for the long term preservation of the wagon as it will be under cover for much of its life.

Fund raising

Just prior to the end of his year, Immediate Past Master John Ingham abseiled from the top of St Lawrence Jewry next Guildhall in aid of the Lord Mayor's Appeal and the Trust. He described the experience as "A bit scary when you lean over the edge for the first time and put your trust in the ropes but very exhilarating when you get over that". Together with Jail & Bail, John raised £2,100 for the Trust after necessary payments to The Red Cross and The Lord Mayor's Appeal. The Trustees are most grateful to him.

18 Years Ago in The Fueller

Issue no.11 of The Fueller, published December 1998, is particularly interesting and was the first to stretch out from four to six pages. Colin and Kay MacLeod had had a very active year and the reports include the Company barbecue in June "overlooking the extensive lake which Colin has laid out in the grounds of Carlton House, near Newark". Sadly a wet day.

David Waring was installed at the Armourers and Brasiers' Hall. The response at the dinner on behalf of the guests was made by Dr "Dick" Austen AO, the then Australian Representative of the Coal Industry. Two years later, Dick became a Fueller and he still comes from New South Wales to our dinners.

"Country Life" had carried a brief but interesting article on the Company which is quoted in full "presumably pursuing the theory that small is beautiful". We were the smallest City Livery Company, with 59 full liverymen at that time.

With visits to Billingsgate on the Isle of Dogs, Fortnums, HMS Sultan, the Chiltern Open Air Museum (PM Paul Glover was Chairman of the Museum), Alderney and the Black Country Museum, this was clearly a very enjoyable year.

The Company's possessions no.10

At the Installation Court in October last year, Master Neville Chamberlain presented a late 19th Century silver loving cup to the Company in memory of his year. It is a bellied cup with an applied girdle and leaf-capped scrolled handles, on a round spread foot. The domed lid is with finial. The silversmith is Hukin & Heath and the cup was assayed in Birmingham in 1891.

The cup is engraved with the Company's coat of arms and inscribed: Neville Chamberlain CBE. Master, Royal Charter Year 2014-15.

On the same occasion, Mistress Joy Chamberlain presented a lovely mid-Victorian silver goblet to

the Company. The goblet has a floral chased bowl with gilt interior, tapering with knopped stem

onto a round spread foot with engraved bright cut decoration. The maker is George Unite and the goblet was assayed in London in 1864. The goblet is engraved: "JRC" 2014/15.



At this year's Installation Court, Master John Ingham presented an early 20th Century sterling silver loving cup to the Company in celebration of his year. The cup is hand chased with foliate work and has scroll side handles and features a large foliate finial on the lid. It is in classical Georgian style with a deep porringer body on a flat base and hand chased lid. The cup was made in London by Skinner and Company and assayed in London in 1904.

The cup is engraved with the Company's coat of arms and inscribed: Presented to The Worshipful Company of Fuellers by John and Jenny Ingham, Master and Mistress Fueller 2015-16.
