#### LCAG HOSTS FIRST AGM

On 24th June 2025, the Livery Climate Action Group (LCAG) held its first Annual General Meeting as an unincorporated association at the Urban Farmer Project on Shoe Lane. Alderman Alison Gowman was elected as Chair and gave a review of LCAG activities over the last year and its plans for the future, all aligned with the vision of working for a resilient and sustainable City of London.



The first Executive was elected: Heather Barrett-Mold; Anthony Bickmore; Rob Casey; David Chitty; Helen Dobson; Alison Gowman; Simon Gray; Averil Macdonald; Juna Margariti; Gordon Masterton; Stuart Mitchell and Anne Punter.

Alison concluded with a plea to member SPOCs (Single Points of Contact) to be the lifeblood, eyes and ears of LCAG by building networks; writing articles for blogs; presenting at an online seminar about what their livery is doing; contributing

to LCAG's annual review, showing how the Livery movement and its networks are making a meaningful impact towards a net zero sustainable and resilient City.

## REFURBISHMENT OF SKINNERS' HALL

Andrew Kennett described the recent refurbishment of Skinners' Hall, a Scheduled Monument of national importance. The original hall on the current site, built about 1295, was destroyed in the Great Fire of London and rebuilt in 1670. The interior of the Hall was remodelled in 1847. Restoration work was carried out following bomb damage during the Second World War. But it remains a fine example of a 17th century livery hall, which survives well.

The recent extensive refurbishment significantly enhanced wall insulation, restored window shutters and installed roof air-source heat pumps on the roof so the hall is now 100% electrically powered, requiring the Skinners to finance an upgrade to the nearest substation. It is an excellent example of designing for sustainability, and Historic England has commended the team for ensuring everything significant was saved to retain the history of the Hall, whilst allowing it to develop, as it must, into a building fit for the 21st century.

Alison visited the site in 2023 and published <u>this blog</u> afterwards. The presentation concluded with <u>an excellent video illustrating the work done and its challenges</u>. For further information, see the presentation <u>here</u>.

**Rob Casey** provided an update on lessons learned in carbon footprint calculations for selected Livery Companies and revealed some useful annual reductions from targeted interventions (eg Merchant Taylors from 431 tonnes in 2012 to 126 tonnes today). He encouraged the use of targets for all aspects of Climate Action Plans, including influencing and offsetting. **Joanna Knight** provided an overview of the work of the committee and the milestones since its formation in 2022.


The committee is focused on knowledge sharing and championing 'best practice' within the furniture and furnishing sectors and has hosted four major events designed to support the journey to greater sustainability.

James Stopford tackled the important topic of Food, Eating and Dining. He drew on guidance from the Fellowship of Clerks; the LCAG Guidance Note written by the Pan-Livery Food Group; ReLondon's mission to waste less and to reuse, repair, share and recycle more; City of London Corporation policies on the welfare of egg-laying hens, and its sustainable Fish Cities pledge; its Procurement Code, Fairtrade Resolution and Modern Slavery statement, all of which are relevant in our relationship with "stuff".

James made the convincing case that whilst these are all part of the regulatory landscape, the key driver for sustainable improvements is ultimately to sustain and enhance the reputation of the City and Livery for excellence, heritage, standards and quality. View the full presentation here.
